Summary of Community Workshops and Pop-Up Events

A total of six community workshops were conducted throughout the ATP planning process to gather input and solicit feedback on recommendations. Through direction from the Technical Advisory Committee, it was determined that the pop-up workshop approach would be the best avenue to gather input for the project. This would allow the project team to gather feedback at events where an audience is already present.

Workshop #1: Spring Eggstravaganza

The first workshop was conducted on Saturday, April 20, 2019 as part of the City's Spring Eggstravaganza at the Rialto Civic Center. A project booth was present to gather input on issues, concerns and solutions they'd like to see related to active transportation. Bicycle lights, reflective bands, and bike helmet give-aways were provided at the booth. A table map, pedestrian and bicycle improvements boards, voting exercises and surveys were displayed to gather information from the public. This outreach event was well attended with over 50 participants.

Workshop #2: Inland Empire 2019 Walk Like MADD

The second workshop took place on Saturday, May 4, 2019 during the Inland Empire 2019 Walk Like MADD run at Charlotte N. Werner Elementary School. A project booth with information boards, voting exercises, interactive complete streets design board, a table map, and surveys were present to obtain information on opportunities and constraints from participants. Bicycle lights, reflective bands, and bike helmet give-aways were also provided at the booth. The attendance for this event was around 30 visitors who participated the booth.

Workshop #3: Seamless BBQ Kickoff

The third workshop was held on Friday, June 7, 2019 as part of Rialto’s Seamless BBQ Kick-off at Joe Sampson Park. A project booth was present to gather information on opportunities and existing issues from participants. Maps, data, and surveys were displayed and passed out at the booth. Additional activities included a magnet board where children could build their “ideal street” and a spinning wheel that participants could spin for a chance to win a prize after filling out a survey which included bicycle lights, reflective bands, and a bike helmet. The estimated attendance for this event was over 45 visitors.

Workshop #4: Pump It Up BBQ Event

The fourth community workshop took place on Wednesday, July 10, 2019 at Rialto City Park. The event was a summer barbecue hosted by Rialto Unified School District. A variety of outreach methods were used to ensure community participation. Flyers and posters were distributed, both in English and in Spanish, as well as surveys that allowed residents to share their thoughts and concerns regarding active transportation. Bicycle lights, reflective bands, and a raffle for a bike helmet were provided as give-aways at the booth. This event had a lower attendance rate due to extreme heat conditions.

Workshop #5: National Night Out

The fifth community workshop was conducted on Tuesday, August 6, 2019 during the National Night Out Event at the Rialto Civic Center. National Night Out promotes community spirit and enhances police-community partnerships to create a safe city. This yearly event draws hundreds of residents from Rialto with games, vendors, police car rides, police K9 demonstrations, and more. A project booth was set-up and a variety of outreach methods were used to gather community input on the proposed bikeway network. Bilingual surveys were also distributed. In addition, bicycle lights, reflective bands, and a raffle for a bike helmet were provided as give-aways. Due to the popularity of the National Night Out event, this workshop had the highest participation with over 75 visitors.

Workshop #6: Bike Rodeo at the Pacific Electric Bike Trail

The proposed bikeway network was presented to gather any final feedback. Bicycle lights, reflective bands, and a raffle for a bike helmet were provided as give-aways at the booth. This event was well attended by the community with over 50 visitors to the ATP booth.
