Scott Williams, Director of Finance, presented staff report to Request City Council to: (1) Conduct a Public Hearing on the City's Fiscal Year 2025-26 Proposed Annual Budget, (2) Approve Resolution No. 8364, RHA Resolution No. 02-25, RUA Resolution No. 08-42 and Rialto Redevelopment Successor Agency Resolution No. 8365 for the City's Fiscal Year 2025-26 Annual Budget; (3) Resolution No. 8366 Adopting the Fiscal Year 2025-26 Appropriations Limit (Gann Limit); and, (4) Approve Resolution No. 8367 Adopting the Fiscal Year 2025-26 Citywide Classification and Compensation Plan.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott opened the Public Hearing and asked if anyone wished to speak.

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No one came forward.

Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Scott, second by Council Member Carrizales and carried by a 5-0 vote to close the Public Hearing.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott asked if any reclassifications were for the purpose of giving additional payroll funds to employees.

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Director of Finance Williams stated that the purpose of the positions is meant to be new and not as a promotion or an enhancement of a currently filled position.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott clarified that the reclassifications are not associated with promotions.

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Director of Finance Williams believed all positions are vacant.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott expressed his concerns about the economic uncertainty of the City, the State, and the Nation. He voiced concerns about the direction of the City of Rialto related to the continued hiring of management and personnel and costly maintenance operations.

He shared information about the City of Los Angeles announcing 600 layoffs. He stated the City of Rialto has not experienced that because of profits from sales tax. It may not last. He cautioned management that restaurants are down 20-30 percent. The economy is starting to fall and needs attention.

The City avoided bankruptcy in 2008 during the economic crash. The City would not have survived had it not been because of a good City Council and staff members. He advised that the City needs to be more conservative with expenses such as supplies.

He pointed out the Community Services Department and hoped the City was not overbudget. He expects the budget to be practical and accurate and no concealed funds. Years ago, City Council discontinued funds to roll over from year to year, and it is still occurring. If the Item moves forward, he requested with the condition that department funds roll-overs stop. It must not be allowed. He referenced the report to point out that maintenance and operations has grown largely in the last ten years.

He stated the City needs to budget. During a project, there is always maintenance and operations costs associated with that project that the City Council is not made aware of. That needs to be a requirement so that the City Council is informed of those costs so that they stop growing at the rate that it is going.

Mayor Pro Tem Scott stated that expenditures by department in FY 22/23 was \$101,367,833.00. The proposed budget is \$161,830,400. That is an increase of \$61 million, and it is very concerning. The City may be fine today; the situation may be different next year.

The sales tax figures have increased significantly in the past five years from \$10 million to \$60 million.

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Director of Finance Williams stated it has increased significantly.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott stated the tax dollars are one-time dollars. They are not recurring dollars. The City needs to make certain it keeps businesses alive and thriving so that those funds continue. The City should be proud that it came from the very bottom of sales tax generators to the top three. Rancho Cucamonga and Ontario are ahead of Rialto.

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Director of Finance Williams stated only Ontario is ahead.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott stated the City cannot lose sight that sales tax can easily go away.

He briefly addressed the Fire Department positions and it was determined that the new Fire Chief will review the necessity of those positions.

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Director of Finance Williams stated they will be brought back at the appropriate time.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott stated there should be changes related to Utilities and there should be a finance individual overseeing that large budget. He hopes the City Council is open to that request.

He strongly requested that mid-year budget should take place in December so that adjustments can be made based on the economy.

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Director of Finance Williams stated they will bring it back in December.

Council Member Carrizales thanked Director of Finance Williams for a great presentation.

He also expressed concerns with the uncertainty of the economy and the City's current expenditures. He, too, is concerned about the sales tax funds not being as robust next year. He wants each department to be examined to make certain the budget is conservative as possible.

He requested that Community Services scale back on some events to make certain core events continue such as Fourth of July.

He is hearing from the small business community that sales are declining due to the state of national affairs. The public is not making purchases as before. They are staying home and practicing conservative spending. He hopes the City can adjust and course correct now.

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Mayor Baca complimented Director of Finance Williams on a great presentation. He stated the City currently has a healthy budget and good reserves. The City cannot be complacent. It should find ways to increase revenue. He understands why sales and restaurants sales are declining, and that is revenue that the City loses. He agrees department roll-over funds need to be examined to make sound decisions.

He is pleased with the budget and the City moving forward. There should be a mid-year budget to see what changes need to be made.

On the matter of events, he is suggesting the City hold an International Day event, wi-fi at City parks and soccer park, and expanding the swimming pool. Feasibility needs to take place to make certain people of all abilities can take benefit.

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Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Scott, second by Mayor Baca and carried by a 5-0 vote to Approve Resolution No. 8364, RHA Resolution No. 02-25, RUA Resolution No. 08-42 and Rialto Redevelopment Successor Agency Resolution No. 8365 for the City's Fiscal Year 2025-26 Annual Budget; Resolution No. 8366 Adopting the Fiscal Year 2025-26 Appropriations Limit (Gann Limit); and Approve Resolution No. 8367 Adopting the Fiscal Year 2025-26 Citywide Classification and Compensation Plan; and to Include the following addendums: No City Department budget roll-overs, adding International Day to Special Events list; additional City positions.

Cynthia Alvarado-Crawford, Director or Community Services, and Ana Lenou, with AGI, presented staff report and Request City Council to: (1) Conduct a Public Hearing to Solicit Public Comments from Interested Citizens; (2) Adopt Resolution No. 8368 adopting The Consolidated Plan for Fiscal Years 2025-2029, The Annual Action Plan for Fiscal Year 2025-2026, The Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing for Fiscal Year 2025-2029, and The Citizen Participation Plan; (3) Authorize the City Manager, or their Designee, to Submit The Consolidated Plan and The Annual Action Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; and (4) Authorize the City Manager, or their Designee, to Take all Actions Necessary to Implement the Programs Identified in the Consolidated Plan and the Annual Action Plan.

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Mayor Baca opened the Public Hearing and asked if anyone wished to speak.

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Gwendolyn Heard Nelson addressed the City Council related to the ad hoc committee's recommendation to reduce the amount of funding to the Bethune Center. She asked that the City Council reconsider and add \$10,000 to their grant request.

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Amy Malone addressed the City Council related to the reduction of funding to the Bethune Center. She asked that the City Council reconsider and add \$10,000 to their grant request. She asked that the City Council recognize the National Council of Negro Women, NCNW, with pride and recognize the work done and continue to do in this City.

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Romaine Washington addressed the City Council related to the reduction of funding to the Bethune Center and gave a brief synopsis of how the Bethune Center has served the community. She asked that the City Council reconsider cutting funding and add \$10,000 to this community organization who are willing to serve and support the public.

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Debra Jackson addressed the City Council related to the 52 percent reduction of funds to the Bethune Center and the impact it would have on their services to the community. She is requesting the City Council to add \$10,000 to their budget. They are City partners.

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Public Comment

Public Comment

Mike Story addressed the City Council related to the request for funds to Sunrise Life Development. He is asking for the City Council's consideration of \$35,000 to continue their monthly mobile pop-up food distribution to serve the hurt, the disadvantaged and the underserved.

He thanked Fire Chief Park for all his work in the City and for his team saving his wife's life in May. He wished him well in his retirement. He has been a great model for his team. What he's done should be duly recognized.

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Zee Griffith addressed the City Council related to the 52 percent reduction of funds to the Bethune Center. She is asking that the City Council help with the additional \$10,000 they need to continue their journey and partnership with the City of Rialto.

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Dr. Ayanna Balogun addressed the City Council related to the reduction of funds to the Bethune Center. She briefly discussed the Bethune Center's services. She is asking that the City Council reconsider the proposed \$25,000 reduction and add an additional \$10,000 to grant funding. Part of their model and their creed and commitment to NCNW is to serve the community and make it better than when found.

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Motion by Council Member Perez, second by Council Member Montoya Jr. and carried by a 5-0 vote to Close the Public Hearing.

Mayor Pro Tem Scott asked about the Administration's proposed funding for \$191,274.20 and what it entails. He asked what it is used for.

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Ms. Lenou stated it is the administration cap set aside for administering the program such as preparing documents on behalf of the City, reporting to HUD and Fair Housing services.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott asked if all the funds go to administration organization.

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Ms. Lenou stated no. The Fair Housing Mediation Board is to receive \$35,000. The remaining balance of \$191,274.20 will cover the contract for Avant Garde to provide services.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott expressed his concerns and stated that there is something wrong when the administration cost is \$191,274.20 and the City is giving organizations a total of \$169,705.65.

The CDBG Administration costs more than the funds that should be going to help people in this community.

He emphasized that the City is giving \$5,000 to Veterans. That is problematic. There is nobody more important in our community than the veterans.

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Director of Community Services Alvarado-Crawford stated that the allocations caps allow for 15 percent of the CDBG funds to be allocated for public services.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott asked if it is all Federal funds.

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Director of Community Services Alvarado-Crawford stated it is.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott emphasized that the person in Washington, D.C. should be contacted to change the law. He stated it is ridiculous, and you either help the community, or you don't.

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Director of Community Services Alvarado-Crawford stated it is the ad hoc committee's recommendation.

Mayor Pro Tem Scott emphasized that it does not matter whose recommendation it is. Disbursing more funds to administration costs than granting organizations to help people is extremely wrong.

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Mayor Baca stated he understands the frustration, but the policy needs to be changed at the Federal level. These are the guidelines set forth that the City has to follow under the CDBG guidelines. Until that is changed, they have to determine if there is a possibility of adding \$10,000 to the Bethune Center.

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Director of Community Services Alvarado-Crawford stated that funds can be reallocated from within the organizations allotted.

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Mayor Baca asked if the \$10,000 can be removed from the CDBG Administration and added to the Bethune Center.

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Director of Community Services Alvarado-Crawford stated the City is capped for 15 percent. That is the most that can be allocated for that specific community services for those organizations.

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Mayor Baca stated that he agrees with Mayor Pro Tem Scott. It is unfair. He asked if the \$10,000 funds can be either taken from other organizations or a City budget to allocate the funds. That would be an alternative.

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Council Member Perez stated that the ad hoc committee had a difficult time because it is capped at 15 percent for all the organizations. It had to be based on the people they were serving. A lot of them were reduced not only one. Several organizations received less than requested. There was a need to spread it based on their service numbers.

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Ms. Lenou stated the cap is set at 15 percent of the City's allocation. Allocation plus program income is how 15 percent is determined. There is only one allocation reported. The 15 percent that HUD will allow is \$169,705.00. Out of that, it is for public services.

The applications presented is the specific funds that the City Council can allocate program for public services. It is the maximum that HUD will allow within the CDBG program.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott asked if a letter had been written to Washington, D.C., asking for change and showing anyone the figures.

Ms. Lenou stated she is not aware.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott stated he will write correspondence. It is ridiculous.

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Mayor Baca clarified that there is no probability of allocating the \$10,000 from within CDBG funds based on the requirements outlined without reducing the funds to another organization.

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Ms. Lenou stated that is correct. The City Council has a specific amount of funds to distribute to provide public services from this budget.

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Mayor Baca asked if the City could allocate its budget to disburse \$10.000 to NCNW.

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Director of Finance Williams stated yes, the City Council can make a motion.

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Council Member Carrizales asked if it is the 20 percent cap is \$191,000. That is the maximum that can be charged.

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Ms. Lenou stated that it is not her amount. It is the amount that you the City is allowed to use for the administration of the program.

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Council Member Carrizales asked if the City is allowed to use 21 percent.

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Ms. Lenou stated no.

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Council Member Carrizales asked if 15 percent can be used.

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Ms. Lenou stated yes.

Council Member Carrizales asked why not take it from there.

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Ms. Lenou stated 15 percent of the public services cap cannot be increased.

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Council Member Carrizales stated he understood. He asked if it was possible to extract funds from the Sensory Room Project.

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Mayor Baca stated in determining funds, they considered the number of services each organization would be providing. It was based on those numbers.

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Mayor Baca asked if there is a second motion to his recommendation.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott stated he will second the motion.

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Council Member Perez asked what the motion was.

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Mayor Baca stated the motion is to have the City provide an additional \$10,000 request to NCNW from the General Fund.

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Council Member Perez asked if the City could disburse funds to other organizations whose funds were reduced.

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City Manager Williams stated the City Council can make a motion to fund any other organizations to the level that they request. The City received fewer CDBG funds than in previous years, which made it more difficult to allocate funding.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott asked if each Council Member has discretionary funds.

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City Manager Williams stated yes. It was approved as part of the budget this year.

Mayor Pro Tem Scott stated the \$10,000 discretionary funds that each Council Member has must go to foundations or nonprofit organizations. He is open to donating a portion of his funds to some organizations.

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Council Member Perez stated she did not mean anyone specifically. She wondered if there were additional funds that could be allocated to the City of Rialto projects.

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Motion by Mayor Baca, second by Mayor Pro Tem Scott and carried by a 5-0 vote to approve \$10,000 from the General Fund be granted to the National Council of Negro Women for the Bethune Center.

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Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Scott, second by Council Member Carrizales and carried by a 5-0 vote to Adopt Resolution No. 8368 adopting The Consolidated Plan for Fiscal Years 2025-2029, The Annual Action Plan for Fiscal Year 2025-2026, The Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing for Fiscal Year 2025-2029, and The Citizen Participation Plan; Authorize the City Manager, or their Designee, to Submit The Consolidated Plan and The Annual Action Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; and Authorize the City Manager, or their Designee, to Take all Actions Necessary to Implement the Programs Identified in the Consolidated Plan and the Annual Action Plan.

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Mayor Baca stated that the City Council should take a position through correspondence to try to change the requirements on the number of monies used for administrative costs versus for services to the community.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott stated he would second the motion.

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City Attorney Vail stated that the City Council can give direction to City Manager Williams.

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Motion by Mayor Baca, second by Mayor Pro Tem Scott and carried by a 5-0 vote to correspond to Washington, D.C. and include City of Rialto Representatives requesting percentages be changed related to the CDBG funds distributed for public service programs.

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Council Member Perez asked what time the community meetings were conducted.

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Fire Marshal Jensen stated the meetings were conducted at 6:00 p.m. Both meetings lasted for approximately 45 minutes.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott commented that at the EDC meeting, the largest property owner was present, and they concurred with the recommendation. He asked if the new homes built in the area follow current fire regulations related to the fire zones.

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Fire Marshal Jensen stated that is correct.

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Council Member Montoya Jr. inquired about the maps and asked if by increasing the zone severity, would it increase resident homeowners' insurance or possibly being removed from insurance.

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Fire Chief Park stated that it has already decreased, and the whole intent of the maps is to ensure that insurance is maintained throughout the State. The goal is to increase the safety to maintain insurance.

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Council Member Montoya Jr. stated he understands that it did decrease. He asked if it should increase, does that also inflate the possibility of the residents' homeowner's insurance policy fees increasing or being removed by insurance.

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Fire Chief Park stated that if the models change, then yes. It does change insurance policy fees. The City's model is going in the opposite direction.

Consider Ordinance No. 1700 Adopting Updated Fire Hazard Severity Zone Maps for the City of Rialto

Mayor Baca stated the insurance ultimately determines if a homeowner is in the danger zone that creates the increase or decrease or policy cancellations.

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Mayor Pro Tem Scott asked if Rialto is one of the areas that decreased.

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Chief Park stated yes. Rialto is one of the few areas in the state that decreased.

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Council Member Carrizales thanked Fire Chief Park and the Fire Department for all his efforts attempting land ownership at the habitat.

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Motion by Mayor Pro Tem Scott, second by Council Member Montoya Jr. and carried by a 5-0 vote to accept introduction of Ordinance No. 1700 Adopting Updated Fire Hazard Severity Zone Maps for the City of Rialto.
