Inland Equity Community Land Trust (formerly California Partnership) will work with service providers, CBOs and social service agencies to assist residents in the city of Rialto to enroll in programs for which they are eligible. Inland Equity Community Land Trust will implement a strategy of outreach and enrollment to reduce under-enrollment in SNAP, TANF, Medicaid, SSI, GR, Medical and CHIP for the residence of the City of Rialto. Our focus will be on seniors in assisted living facilities and community members served by the partnering CBOs. We staff social service navigators, volunteers to facilitate program enrollment to health and human service programs. Barriers that often prevent people from accessing benefits include language, transportation and cultural norms that discourage receipt of federal, state and county services. Organizations providing access to health and human service supports have developed innovative approaches for reaching under enrolled people who are not participating in programs for which they are eligible. Eligibility and verification change rapidly across programs and add greatly to an already high level of complexity. State-level legislation frequently allowed or rescinded expansions of eligibility for some population groups covered by federal program options or state-only funded programs. The income verification process for benefits changes almost annually as part of the legislature's budget negotiations. Over the years, changes in federal laws governing health and human services programs, as well as clarifications in federal rules or guidance has led to frequent updates in the eligibility requirements.

Low-income individuals can face personal, community, and systems barriers to receiving public supports from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP/food stamps), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Medicaid, Medical and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), General Relief, and Social Security (SSI/SSP). Barriers that often prevent people from accessing benefits include language, transportation and cultural norms that discourage receipt of federal, state and county services. Organizations providing access to health and human service supports have developed innovative approaches for reaching under enrolled people who are not participating in programs for which they are eligible. As such, federal and state government funds have been invested in projects across the country to outline the effects of coordinated care. Collaborative models including partnerships between housing providers, health plans, and social service agencies improve health care outcomes while reducing health care costs for seniors and people with disabilities who live in subsidized housing. The results include reduced hospital use, delayed entrance into long-term care, decreased emergency room utilization, and measurable cost savings. As such, more federal, state and county government funds will be available to the residence of Rialto. Collaborative models including partnerships between housing providers, health plans, and social service agencies improve health care outcomes while reducing health care costs for seniors and people with disabilities who live in subsidized housing. The results include reduced hospital use, delayed entrance into long-term care, decreased emergency room utilization, and measurable cost savings. Inland Equity Community Land Trust's curriculum, collateral materials, community training and enrollment events are proven to engage residents and facilitate the enrollment process with the underlying goal of establishing a coordination of health, behavioral health, and social services in manner that will improve health outcomes and establish a more efficient and effective use of resources.

We will focus this program on low-income seniors and younger people with disabilities who are enrolled in both the Medicare and Medicaid programs. Dual eligibles are among the sickest and poorest individuals, and face many barriers when navigating government programs. Fifty-five percent of this population has an annual income below \$10,000, and they are three times more likely than the rest of the Medicare population to be disabled, in addition to having higher rates of diabetes, pulmonary disease, stroke, mental disorders, and Alzheimer's disease.

17.6% of the population for whom poverty status is determined in Rialto, CA (18k out of 102k people) live below the poverty line, a number that is higher than the national average of 13.1%. San Bernardino County has the 2nd highest application denial rate of California counties for the CalWORKs program. Only Los Angeles, with a much larger population is higher.

Inland Equity Community Land Trust coordinated the Health4All Kids Collaborative with support from the California Endowment. The work was focused in two areas, San Bernardino and the Eastern Coachella Valley. In Coachella, we had a total of 5,866 people who received both Medical and MISP education and 1,811 people were successfully enrolled in either program. In San Bernardino the work was referral based and the Collaborative did outreach. 14,000 people received information or a referral to a service provider.
