Rialto Juvenile T.E.A.M. Project

The Project is a wraparound service model addressing youth recidivism by providing community-based rehabilitation services to 65 youth between the ages of 14 and 17 who meet the following criteria:

- Reside or attend school in the cities of Rialto, Colton or San Bernardino;
- are on probation or who have been arrested, charged with or convicted of a misdemeanor criminal offense, and
- have a history or mental health issues and/or a substance use disorder.

The TEAM Project logic model consists of six sections:

1. Inputs – the structure of the program’s foundation, such as, community relationships, a referral network, an advisory committee and collaborators investments.
2. Activities – services provided by the lead agency, advisory committee and community-based organizations.
3. Outputs – anticipated preliminary results from implementing the activities.
4. Intermediate Outcomes – how the project affects the clients through the attempt to predict the effects of the services provided, such as, reduction in drug/alcohol use and decreased school disciplinary infractions.
5. Long-term Outcomes – specific behavior outcomes, such as reduced crime and recidivism and an increase in prosocial activities.
6. Impact – Overall positive affect on the clients, such as, improved quality of life and reduced costs associated with crime and drug abuse.

Program Progress

Two-Year Progress Report

- City Council approved the Prop 47 – Rialto Juvenile T.E.A.M. Project on July 25, 2017 through Resolution 7172
- Program became fully functional in July 2018 and began recruitment process.
- Implementation difficulties caused delays with recruitment.
 - Program management adjustment from consulting firm to lead agency personnel.
 - Record keeping of clients as they transversed from one CBO to another.
 - Recruitment of clients due to selection criteria.
 - Evaluation criteria for development of outcomes differed from original proposal due to legal issues with collection of arrest and conviction data for clients being unavailable.
- On June 11, 2019, City Council approved a one-year extension of the Prop 47 – Rialto Juvenile T.E.A.M. Project through Resolution 7521
- Between July 2018 and August 2019, the program has provided:
 - Referred 166 clients
 - Served 143 clients
 - Approved 35 clients for Prop 47

Program Progress

Progress to MRCH 2021

- Program was delayed for several months due to COVID-19 pandemic shutdowns beginning March 2020.
- BCSS has reevaluated eligible expenses to include costs for implementation of remote attendance and evaluation.
- In September 2020, BCSS began a budget and expense review with all grantees to discuss funding progress and preparation of final reporting.
- In September 2020, IBHS was unable to continue case management and intake assessment services. Per discussion and approval of the LAC Committee the services were reallocated to Rialto Family Health Services and Clay Counseling and new collaboration process was established.
- In November 2020, with established COVID-19 protocols in place, CBO's resumed social distancing in-person group program sessions.
- Through March 2021, the program has provided:
 - Referred 268 clients (Sept 2019 – Mar 2021 = 102)
 - Served 245 clients (Sept 2019 – Mar 2021 = 102)
 - Approved 61 clients for Prop 47 (Sept 2019 – Mar 2021 = 26)

THE LOVE PROGRAM (Living & Overcoming w/Virtue and Excellence)

L.O.V.E Diamonds participate in bi-weekly self-development workshops building self-awareness, self-love, leadership skills and workforce development skills. Workshops will primarily focus on self-empowerment, academic achievement, career building and planning in the areas of (STEM) Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. In following these workshops, students will engage in circles of conversations, which will serve as an assessment of the key concepts they have learned. In the space of ten weeks, students will be able to apply the student learning outcomes outlined below to their internal and external environment. Students will then utilize these workshops as a source of aid in pursuit of completing their final vision board project entitled “**LOVE, Preparation and My Future.**” In week five of the program, students will be expected to construct a project that highlights the seven principles of development: **Integrity, Self Love, Self Discipline, Self Empowerment, Education Planning, Career Planning, and Community Involvement.** At the end of the program, students will then complete a final evaluation of L.O.V.E Diamonds and present their boards at the culmination program.

Student Learning Outcomes

Formulate a sense of self-love, self-esteem and self-empowerment.

Demonstration of strong communication and critical thinking skills to establish leadership skills.

Establish short term and long-term goals in their internal and external environment.

Identify an area of interest within STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) or area of interest outside of STEM.

THE LOVE PROGRAM (Living & Overcoming w/Virtue and Excellence)

- Services Provided: Mentoring, Career and Educational Planning
- Program Duration: 10 Weeks (Each Session/Three Sessions a Year)
- Year 1 – Present - We were allotted \$33,000/\$12,500 per year – Funds Exhausted July 2020
 - Served a total of 57 Transitional Youth/ 28 Prop 47 Qualifying within Rialto and San Bernardino County (Grant Period)
- Year 3- Present – We continued providing services and requested an extension of funding to cover services through grant period of September 30, 2021.

Clay Counseling

Clay Counseling Solutions (CCS) is a San Bernardino based community mental health organization. At the start of the TEAM Program, CCS provided individual mental health therapy services to referred participants. As the TEAM program evolved, CCS stepped into additional roles as needed to provide clinical assessments for enrollment and anger management group support.

- CCS stepped into the role of co-lead CBO in partnership with RFHS September 2020, to provide clinical assessments needed to determine client eligibility.
- Since 2018 - CCS has engaged with 47 clients total to date.
- 26 out of the 47 were engaged during the COVID-19 pandemic with necessary telehealth restrictions.
- 15 out of the 47 have received direct mental health services
 - (6 ongoing, 9 completed).

YAP TEAM Elements

- **Recruitment:** YAP leverages its relationships with San Bernardino County Probation Department, the Youth Justice Center, the district attorney's office, and other nonprofit coalitions to recruit, enroll, serve, and connect eligible youth to recommended TEAM supports.
- **Culturally Relevant Soft Skills Training:** YAP provides 12 hours of work readiness training that consists of confidence building activities, essential workplace skill development, and work readiness certification. Each cohort culminates in a festive event where participant's accomplishments are recognized.

Rialto Family Health Services is a Community Based Non-profit, 501(3)c Organization. We are committed to the development of human potential and the strengthening of community support.

Services provided through TEAM program:

❖ Case Management/Intake Enrollment Services

- Completion of consent forms
- Referral Coordination with City of Rialto, Probation and other Community Based Organizations (CBO's)
- Ongoing monitoring and recording of progress in files
- Coordination and lead CBO Case Collaboration meetings

Civil Legal Services

The Welfare and Institution code Section 786: Mandates that juvenile courts dismiss petitions and seal the records of youths when probation is satisfactorily completed.

When the juvenile is cited with any violation, those infractions will follow them permanently.

Rialto Family Health Services will assist youths on a one on one individual basis. Including the review of records to determine if the violations make them eligible to have their records sealed.

Rialto Family Health Services educates, motivates and assists juveniles in understanding the record sealing process and verifies that their records have been sealed.

Things You Should Know About Record Sealing

- When a youth successfully completes the Terms of Active Probation their Probation Officer will recommend that their records be sealed.
- If a youth is not sure if their records were sealed after probation was completed, the Probation Officer would need to be contacted.
- If a youth is arrested, but not put on probation and the case was dismissed, their Public Defender is responsible for requesting to their records sealed.
- If a youth is not sur if their records from the arrest were sealed, the Juvenile Public Defenders Office would need to be contacted.
- If the youth committed a serious offense or crimes you are not eligible to have your records sealed, unless the court has dismissed your petition.
- If a youth has a driver's license and wants to have their juvenile traffic record sealed, they must pay a \$25.00 filing fee to the Juvenile Traffic Court.

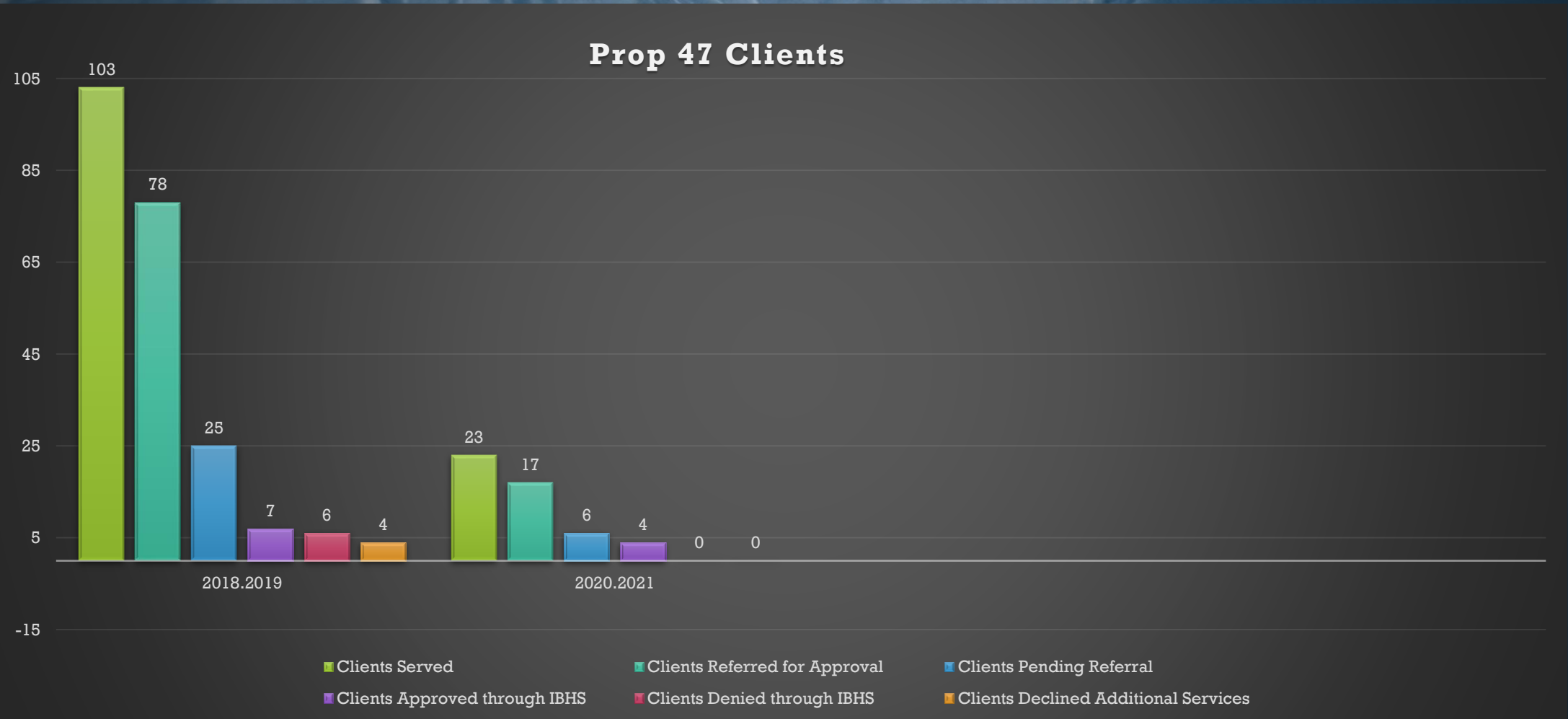
Young Visionaries

Young Visionaries Youth Leadership Academy (Young Visionaries - YVYLA), a multi-award winning, 501(c)(3) nonprofit, has watched the number of youths at high risk rise in San Bernardino County. Young Visionaries started from the inception of the Prop 47 grant. Aiding in the objectives of the T.E.A.M. program which utilizes wraparound service model to provide mental health services and substance abuse treatment to youth offenders in the cities of San Bernardino, Colton, and Rialto. The main goal is to focus on Community rehabilitation by connecting youth and their families with local resources and service providers.

Young Visionaries has a twenty (20) year history of providing mentoring, case management, counseling, and academic services supporting and assisting over 85,000 high-risk youth. There are currently four (4) mentoring programs: the R.E.D. (Resilient Empowered Directed) Mentoring Project; the S.M.A.A.R.T. (Successfully Motivating African Americans Through Resilience Training) Program; the African American Student Achievement Program (AASAP); and the SAM (Student Achievement Mentoring) Program. Each program focuses on helping youth achieve academic success, graduation, career development, and personal manifestation of positive life skills.

SUCCESS STORY

Angel Hernandez and Michael Hernandez have been a part of Prop 47 since 2019, both have shown positive behavioral changes within family communications and have successfully build a positive relationship with family members, and peers. Anger deflections have decreased, for example clients were known to be aggressive and have now learned positive ways to release anger feelings. Both students are currently receiving employment development services and are in track to graduating high school this year.
