Previous Discussion Updates

- Question: Regarding utility bills and an "urgency ordinance" that was released by the state in the 1990s that stated landlords could not be held responsible for a tenant's unpaid utility bill?
 - This was referred to the City Attorney's office for research. A response will be provided once received.
- Question: Regarding fees and if there was "room to increase."
 - Unfortunately, no. We are not able to legally increase fees or rates at this time.
 - Regarding fees. Fees are limited to the "estimated reasonable cost of providing a service" by Government Code section 66014(a) and other supplementary legislation. To comply with this requirement, the City of Rialto employs a consultant periodically to complete a fee study. If the fee study shows the cost of providing a service is more than the fee being charged, a revised fee schedule is presented to the City Council for approval.
 - Regarding rates. Rates are subject to Proposition 218. Proposition 218 was adopted during the November 5, 1996 general election. The official legal title of the measure was: "Voter Approval for Local Government Taxes. Limitations on Fees, Assessments, and Charges. Initiative Constitutional Amendment." This law requires approval by the rate payors to increase rates.
- Question: Regarding water valve turning. Commissioners Hayes and Chitwood both want to see a demonstration.
 - The response received from RWS/Veolia was that the demonstration has not been scheduled yet.
- Question: Regarding an increase in electricity and what it was from.
 - The monthly report presented to the Utilities Commission during the December meeting and

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showed what appeared to be an increase in electricity use and cost was for the month of September 2019. September is a traditionally high electricity usage month and the bill did not show an abnormal increase.

- Question: How much of the video inspection program has been finished?
 - The response received from RWS/Veolia was that 140.5 miles has been inspected via the CCTV/video inspection program as of December 31, 2019. This is approximately 54% of the sewer lines.
- Question: When another Student Commissioner would be assigned?
 - The City Clerk's office was contacted and a request submitted. Student Commissioners are assigned based on application and there have not been any candidates for the Student Commissioner position for the Utilities Commission.
